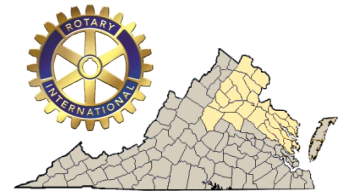

Time to Assess Your Club's Progress in Meeting its APF Goal

There is no better time to give to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund.

In 2004-2005, RI President Glenn E. Estess, Sr. said, "The Foundation belongs to us all. It is our greatest resource for doing good, and it is our responsibility to maintain its strength." As we approach the half-way point of our Rotary year it is time for each Rotarian and Club to assess the progress we have made in reaching our annual foundation goals.

Since July 1, \$116,545.89 has been contributed to Annual Programs Fund. Eighty percent, or 43 of our 54 clubs, have made contributions to APF. Bailey's Crossroads Rotary Club leads the way with over \$12,000 in contributions! Four clubs are over \$200 in per capita giving, with Rosslyn-Fort Myer leading with \$293.76.

Rotary's \$200 Million Gates Foundation Challenge Goal

\$195 million raised as of November 25, 2011

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has given Rotary \$355 million in grants for its work to eradicate polio globally. In response, Rotary has committed to raising \$200 million between December 1, 2007 and June 30, 2012. Each Rotary Club is encouraged to raise from the community \$2,000 annually to meet this goal.

The Rotary Foundation Ranked Higher by *Chronicle of Philanthropy*

TRF moves up 14 places to 61st on the list of fundraising charities.

The *Chronicle of Philanthropy* cited the efforts of Interactors and Rotaractors in raising money for polio eradication in its survey that ranked The Rotary Foundation 61st among fundraising charities.

The Rotary Foundation has moved up 14 places in the *Chronicle of Philanthropy's* annual survey of the top 400 fundraising charities in the United States. In the survey, based on fiscal year 2010, the Foundation is 61st on the list of charities that raise funds from private sources, compared with 75th the previous year. Funds

raised for [Rotary's US\\$200 Million Challenge](#) contributed to the ranking.

The *Chronicle*, which covers nonprofit news around the world, ranks the fundraising performance of charities based on cash donations, as well as gifts of stock, real estate, art, medicine, food, and other noncash items.

An [article published by the *Chronicle*](#) provides an overview of the survey and highlights the Foundation's fundraising efforts for polio eradication, particularly among younger donors.

"This is a reflection of yet another outstanding year of fundraising for our Foundation," said John T. Osterlund, Foundation general manager.

The article also noted that Rotaractors raised nearly \$192,000 and Interactors nearly \$274,000 for the polio challenge during the year. Osterlund said involving young donors served as a creative fundraising approach and raised significant dollars.

Based in Washington, D.C., the *Chronicle* is considered the top news source for charity leaders, foundation executives, fundraisers, and others involved in philanthropy.

Caveat Donor: New TRF Areas-of-Focus Contributions

New category of contribution opportunities will not return District Designated Funds (DDF) to District.

Recently, The Rotary Foundation announced new Annual Programs Fund (APF) giving opportunities. Rotarians can now direct APF contributions to any of the Foundation's six areas of focus. Donors may designate contributions to benefit the following areas:

- Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution
- Disease Prevention and Treatment
- Water and Sanitation
- Maternal and Child Health
- Basic Education and Literacy
- Economic and Community Development

Any contribution directed to one of these areas of focus are still included towards a club's annual giving goal and per capita calculations. Likewise, they are eligible for APF recognitions such as "Every Rotarian, Every Year", Sustaining Member Recognition, Paul Harris Fellow Recognition, Paul Harris Society Recognition, Major Donor Recognition and Arch Klumph Society Recognition.

A Fact Sheet prepared by The Rotary Foundation asserts, "The marketing plan for these new giving choices will focus on new donors with an emphasis on non-Rotarian support." Will these opportunities siphon away Annual Programs Fund donations? The TRF Fact Sheet claims they will not. "Integrating the areas

of focus giving opportunities with the Annual Programs Fund (APF) is not intended to redirect those donors who currently and consistently support APF-SHARE. Instead, it serves as a strategic opportunity to engage the large numbers of individuals and clubs that are not currently supporting the Foundation financially."

Here's the caveat: The District 7610 TRF Team advises all Rotarians to be aware that areas-of-focus designated contributions are not included in a district's SHARE calculation and do not generate any district designated funds (DDF). In other words, as a result of contributions to these funds, no contributions would be returned to our District or be available to clubs as DDF to support grants, scholarships or vocational exchange programs. These new giving opportunities have been created for non-Rotarian donors, and the District 7610 TRF team does not encourage their promotion among Rotarians.

India is Aggressively Fighting and Winning the Battle Against Polio!

Only one new case has been reported since January 2011.

It has been 328 days since the onset of paralysis of India's first and only case of wild polio virus for 2011. The case occurred in West Bengal on 13 January.

While great progress has been seen in the country, the Indian Ministry of Health remains cautious. In order for the World Health Organization's South East Asia Region to be certified as being 'polio-free', India must have no new case and must maintain adequate surveillance for a period of three years. But with just one case of polio reported in the last 10 months, India is now more determined than ever to ensure eradication of the disease.

India is planning a series of vaccination rounds for 2012, ensuring that the nation's children continue to be protected against polio. India's next National Immunization Days are scheduled for January and February, and a series of supplementary activities are planned through June. At the same time, intensive surveillance for the wild poliovirus is continuing throughout the country.

A vaccination round using a bivalent vaccine (bOPV) has been tentatively planned for January, but the extent of the round is still under consideration as the country is suffering from a short-term vaccine shortage.

The country's last vaccination round for 2011 was a sub-national campaign which began on 13 November, vaccinating children in key high-risks areas (parts of West Bengal, Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Gujarat and Maharashtra) with bOPV. As part of that effort, Rotarians helped administer bivalent oral polio vaccine to more than 35 million children. The vaccine is effective against the two remaining types of the virus, WPV1 and WPV3. The third type of polio virus, WPV2, is already eradicated.

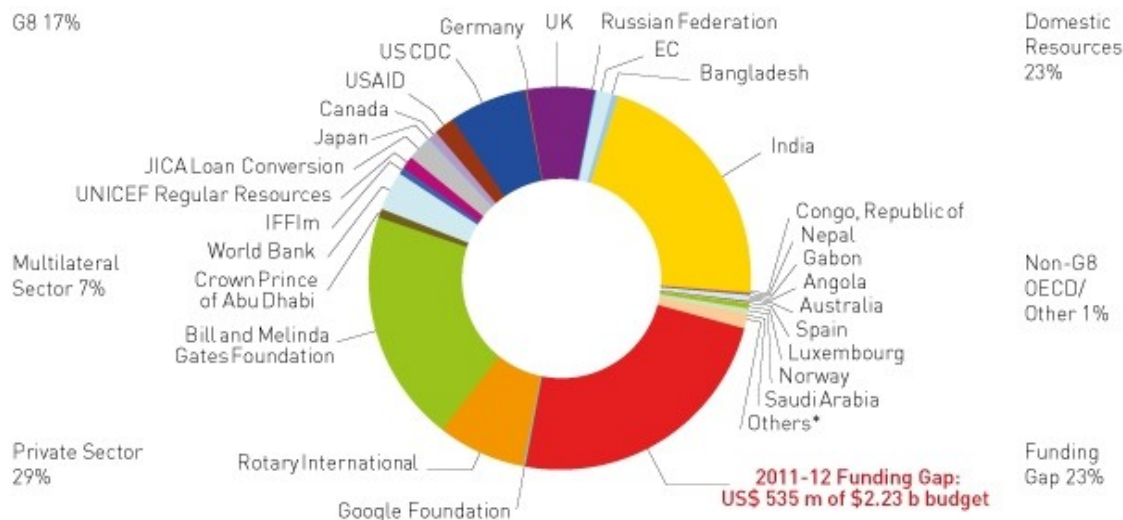

"This year, there have been just over 500 cases worldwide. The fact that only one of those cases is in India is a tremendous achievement that reflects the determination of the nation's leaders and its citizens to finally rid their country -- and the world -- of this terrible scourge," Hewko wrote in an article published earlier this month in the [Hindu Business Line](#).

"Rotary has invested heavily in surveillance in India over the last 12 months," said Bruce Aylward, the World Health Organization's assistant director-general for polio eradication and related areas, at a September meeting of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "That's the reason we can say with confidence that we think we're getting close to zero [cases] in India."

Calendar Year-End Tax Deadlines for TRF Contributions Announced

Please ensure that your contribution reaches TRF by the following deadlines.

It is that time of year again! In the closing weeks of the year, many of our charitably minded Rotarians have already decided they will be making year-end gifts to the Rotary Foundation. Moreover, they have a great appreciation for the advantages of careful year-end planning. Here are some helpful tips for ensuring all contributions are credited by the end of the IRS Tax Year.

The deadlines for contributions to be credited to The Rotary Foundation for the calendar year ending 31 December 2011 are as follows:

Checks:

Must be postmarked 31 December 2011 or prior and **received** at the lockbox (address below) by Friday, 6 January 2012.

Electronic funds transfers:

Electronic fund transfers must be initiated prior to 31 December 2011 and received by Tuesday, 3 January 2012. For wire transfer account details, please contact plannedgiving@rotary.org.

Credit Cards:

Via rotary.org – must be authorized prior to midnight 31 December 2011. Please note gifts received via rotary.org will only benefit the holder of the login. In addition, the Foundation will be unable to accept reclassification and redistribution requests for these gifts.

Via fax, phone or mail to World Headquarters – Fax (847-328-4101), Phone (866-976-8279), email contact.center@rotary.org must be authorized prior to the close of business on 31

December 2011.

To ensure timely recording, credit card contributions should *not* be sent to the lockbox; rather they should be faxed to 847-328-4101 or made online.

Securities:

Securities must be received prior to 31 December 2011. Please note that date falls on a Saturday so the financial markets are likely to close early on 30 December. Instructions in PDF form are available for the [U.S.](#)

Reclassification and redistribution corrections:

Reclassification and redistribution requests for calendar 2011 transactions must be received by Friday, 6 January 2012.



Three in One: New Contribution and Recognition Form Available

Consolidates options on TRF-Direct, Global Contribution, and Recognition Transfer Request Forms.

As part of the Foundation's ongoing efforts to provide more accurate processing and faster acknowledgement to our donors, the Global Contribution Form (123) and Recognition Transfer Form (102) have been revised. The new version is now available at www.rotary.org. These forms are now available as one double-sided document.

The new [TRF Contribution Form \(123\)](#) includes a recurring gift option for donors who wish to give monthly or quarterly (via TRF-Direct). The new contribution form includes the option to make one-time or recurring contributions, and also prominently

features a Quick Response (QR) Code at the top of the page. The QR Code allows users with mobile devices to scan and land directly onto rotary's online giving page, which can also support one-time or recurring gifts.

Please share this information with your fellow Rotarians, and discontinue use of any prior versions of these forms. The link to the form in this article will be updated when TRF makes any future changes to the form. So, TRF prefers that you share the link (provided above), rather than the Forms as attachments, to endure the form account for future revisions .

TRF Quick Tip: Create Your Charitable Gift Annuity Before December 31

Lower CGA rates take effect January 1, 2012.

Rates applicable to TRF's Charitable Gift Annuities will be reduced after December 31, 2011. Thus, individuals considering a Charitable Gift Annuity to support The Rotary Foundation should act now to establish a CGA before the lower rate changes take effect. Donors of Charitable Gift Annuities, obtain tax benefits and, if the donation is \$10,000 or more, they also

Ron Ferrill to be Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator Beginning July 1

Ferrill brings depth of experience to role that assists both clubs and districts in Zone 33.



Martinsville, Virginia, Rotarian Ron Ferrill has been selected by The Rotary Foundation Trustees to serve as the Zone 33 Regional Rotary Foundation Coordinator Beginning June 1, 2012. Zone 33 includes Delaware, Maryland, the District of Columbia, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and part of Tennessee. Ron was Governor of District 7570 in 1998-1999. He was Zone 33 Assistant Regional

Rotary Foundation Coordinator from 2007 to 2011, Group Study Exchange Team Leader to South Korea in 1997, District 7570 Grants Chair from 2003 to present, and Zone 33 Grants Advisor from 2006 to 2007. Ron is probably best known to District 7610 Rotarians for his work with the Zone 33 Rotary Leadership Institute, for which he has served as Vice Chair and on the Board. In 2008, Ron was awarded The Rotary Foundation Distinguished Service Award, the Foundation's highest service recognition that requires substantial service beyond the district level over an extended period of time. Congratulations, Ron, on your appointment to serve the districts and clubs in Zone 33.

Act Now: IRA Charitable Withdrawal Option Ends December 31

Donations from IRA do not count as gross income.

If you would like to make a tax-neutral, charitable withdrawal from your IRA, you only have until December 31 to complete the process. Individuals age 70 1/2 and older can make tax-free distributions of up to \$100,000 (\$200,000 from a couple) from a Roth IRA or a traditional IRA directly to The Rotary Foundation. This provision is in effect until December 31, 2011 and does not apply to 401(k) or other tax-favored retirement plans.

The donor does not need to itemize deductions on his or her

taxes to benefit from the distribution. If the donor does itemize, however, he or she cannot also take the distribution as a deduction.

This is a wonderful opportunity for Rotarians age 70 1/2 and older to make a legacy gift to The Rotary Foundation. By giving to the Permanent Fund and designating SHARE as the recipient of a portion of the earnings, donors ensure that clubs and communities in District 7610 will receive the benefit of their donations in perpetuity. Donations to Annual Programs Fund, Polio, and Rotary Peace Centers also qualify for the tax savings. However, charitable gifts made from an IRA cannot be used for donor advised funds or life income agreements.

Club Foundation Chairs and Area Foundation Advisors are encouraged to inform qualifying Rotarians about this limited-time opportunity, which expires December 31, 2011.
