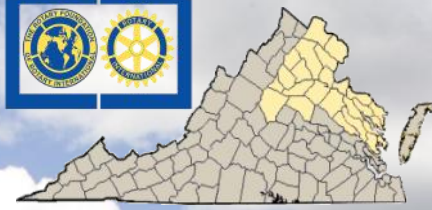

Haiti Will Need More Than Emergency Relief

Giving Now to Annual Programs Fund Helps Ensure Funding will be Available for Grants to Help Rebuild Haiti

The United Nations estimates that two billion dollars has been raised to fund the emergency relief efforts in Haiti.

That's the good news.

The bad news is this: After more than 150,000 victims are buried, after all the TV cameras and celebrities have left the island nation, after all the relief money is spent, more than one million people will be left naked, homeless, and without schools, hospitals, or the lives they once lived.

In such desperation, where will they turn then for help?

Seventeen Rotary Clubs exist in Haiti. They are our neighbors, our fellow Rotarians, and they will need our help to rebuild.

We need to ensure we will have the funds to help in that effort, which the United Nations estimates will cost more than ten billion dollars.

We have the ability to leverage the giving power of an entire foundation that is supported by more than 1.2 million of our fellow Rotarians in over 33,000 clubs in more than 200 countries and territories. But, we need to do our part now to ensure funds are available when the relief effort ends and the rebuilding begins.

The dollars we donate now to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund will be there when we partner with clubs in Haiti to initiate matching grants or simplified grants that will help our neighbors rebuild their lives and their communities. Through The Rotary

Foundation's Annual Programs Fund, we may not be able to erase the pain that the people of Haiti have suffered, but we can partner with our fellow Rotarians in Haiti to help them initiate projects that will have a lasting, positive impact in that country.

The call to action in the days following the earthquake has been answered by Rotarians and Rotary Clubs all across District 7610. They have helped the emergency relief effort in countless ways.

During the same period, however, donations to TRF's Annual Programs Fund dropped almost ninety percent compared to the previous month's contributions, thwarting much of the progress made to rebuild the level of our APF contributions to the rate at which District 7610 was donating before the recent down-turn in the economy.

Giving to help the emergency relief efforts is critical to the survival of hundreds of thousand of people in Haiti. We need to give and to support those efforts.

That's only part of the story: Now, more than ever, we cannot neglect our giving to the Annual Programs Fund, which will provide the financial support that will be needed to help rebuild Haiti. If we don't give now, we will not have the funds later for Matching Grants and Simplified Grants that will fund the international service projects that will supply books for schools, surgical equipment and supplies for hospitals, and countless other projects.

After the tent cities are gone and the



emergency aid has run out, money that we donate today to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund will be available to our clubs to build communities— something Rotarians do best.

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District 7610 Rotarians Respond to a World in Need

Per Capita Annual Giving to APF-SHARE through December 2009 Placed Rotary District 7610 at 17th in the World

While all of us continue to weather the economic recession the best that we can, we also are thankful for the many blessings that we are able to share with those who are barely surviving. "There are so many needs in this world, which Rotarians and Rotary Clubs can help meet through the educational and humanitarian programs of The Rotary Foundation. Those needs are even greater during the current recession. Giving to The Rotary Foundation is one way for Rotarians to give back to communities in need," said District Rotary Foundation Chair and Past District Governor Travis White.

Rotarians in District 7610 have responded overwhelmingly to the call this year to give generously to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund. Your generosity has resulted in a forty percent upsurge in giving over the same period last year.

The Rotary Foundation has a simple mission: To do good in the world. We realize the tremendous amount of good that we can do in this world through our support for The Rotary Foundation, which, in turn, financially supports the humanitarian, educational, community and international projects of local Rotary clubs.

District 7610's December, calendar year-end *per capita* giving of \$92.24 by the 2190 Rotarians in the district's 52 clubs was the seventeenth highest among approximately 530 Rotary districts world-wide.

Twenty-eight percent of the Rotarians in District 7610 have given

\$100 or more and are already Rotary Foundation Sustaining Members, and two clubs are already 100 percent Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Clubs.

Fifty-four Rotarians have given \$1,000 or more so far this year, and they are swelling the membership ranks of District 7610's Paul Harris Society by pledging to give \$1,000 each year they are financially able.

A record number of Rotarians have been recognized this year by The Rotary Foundation as Major Donors for their generous contribution of \$10,000 or more.

"The generous response of Rotarians in District 7610 has been truly inspiring. As Rotarians, we are answering the call for help from a world in need. Our support for The Rotary Foundation ensures that our clubs will have financial support to undertake community and international projects that address those critical, humanitarian needs," said District Governor Horace G. McCormack.

"Giving to the Annual Programs Fund allows The Rotary Foundation to support club-sponsored humanitarian projects that help our neighbors, whether those neighbors live down the street, on an island devastated by an earthquake, or in a remote village half a world away," said Scott Mills, District 7610 Annual Giving Chair.

14,000 Points Still Available for Paul Harris Fellows

TRF Recognition Points Available to Make Paul Harris Fellows of Donors of \$500 or More

Rotary District 7610 is grateful to a very generous Rotarian donor who contributed 20,000 TRF Recognition Points to assist other donors in becoming new or multiple Paul Harris Fellows.

14,000 of those points are still available to match donations of \$500 or more to the TRF Annual Programs Fund for new, first-time or for multiple Paul Harris Fellows.

To be eligible for the match of Recognition Points, contribution checks, payable to "The Rotary Foundation," (or credit card designations) along with the donor's completed [Rotary Foundation Global Contribution Form \(123EN\)](#) should be sent to [Annual Giving Chair Scott Mills](#), c/o EBLG, 8405

The match will apply to donations received at the above address on or after January 15, 2010. The donor must designate Annual Programs Fund on the Global Contribution Form to be eligible for the matching points.

The match applies to both first-time Paul Harris Fellows, as well as existing Paul Harris Fellows whose donations will result in multiple PHF recognition.

The minimum donation for eligibility for the point-match is \$500.00, and only matches in \$100 increments thereafter will apply to donations. Only Rotary District 7610 donors are eligible.



Partnerships and Matching Grants Make a World of Difference

Rotary Foundation Matching Grants Build Communities and Support Partnerships in Liberia, Jamaica, and Lithuania

Liberia

Partnerships and Rotary Foundation monies have made and will always make a difference in lives all around the world. Because of partnerships and Rotary Foundation monies, the Rotary Clubs of Reston, Fairfax, and



Monrovia have built wells and latrines for a village in Liberia. Liberia, a West African country with a population of about 3.4 million people, is rebuilding after fourteen years of war that left the 600 people of Ben Town with no running water, no latrines, and no electricity in their mat homes. Through the efforts of the Reston, Fairfax, and Monrovia Rotary Clubs and The Rotary Foundation, money was raised to help with the various needs in Ben Town. These people now have wells and clean water, latrines, fishing nets and brick homes.

Jamaica

The Rotary Club of Reston's partnership with the Rotary Club of Spanish Town, Jamaica, WI, has resulted in a Rotary Foundation matching grant to provide a reliable water supply and training in hygiene skills for children in Top Jackson,



Simon's and Chin's Elementary Schools in Spanish Town. Top Jackson, multiplying the gift, has taken the initiative to add a chicken coop and a vegetable garden, providing a source of income to enable the school to serve breakfast and lunch for the students, which has increased enrollment.

Additionally, there is a current major project to help fund "toilet blocks" and furniture for the technical training school, through the financial support of a matching grant. The at-risk students at the school will learn a skill and will be able to give back to their country and the world.

Lithuania

The Rotary Club of Alexandria is continuing its work with the Rotary Club of Kauno Tauras, in Lithuania, to provide Humanitarian Projects in that country. This is a second Matching

Grant program with Lithuania for the Rotary Club of Alexandria, and it will provide transportation assistance for the Twelve Step House, a rehabilitation center to treat individuals with drug, alcohol, and psychological problems. The first Lithuania Matching Grant Program, conducted in 2006, was a Literacy Program that assisted the youth of Lithuania in computer and entrepreneurial training, to overcome the endemic socialistic ideas and programs.

This latest project, supported by The Rotary Foundation, involves transportation assistance for the many unemployed and depressed youth in Lithuania, who undertake substance abuse. These youth need rehabilitation assistance and transportation to take them to centers where they can obtain support. Urgent and emergency transportation to Kaunas is nearly impossible to obtain. The center currently uses car rental services to transport patients to and from the facility, to obtain medical supplies for therapeutic support, and to take facility personnel and patients to meetings of support groups in Kaunas.

As a result, the Lithuania project undertook the purchase of a minivan that seats 6 to 8 people, to alleviate the transportation problems. Being able to provide transportation will save the rehabilitation center operating costs, thus providing resources for other rehabilitation matters and drug control expenses.

The Twelve Step House provides services for the entire Kaunas region. The entire community will benefit from treatment of substance abusers. Untreated substance abuse has social and economic costs to the entire community, including the human toll, health costs, accident costs, law enforcement costs, and lack of productivity. These costs are very real to the city of Kaunas and its local government.

The Twelve Step House Center receives some support from the Lithuanian Department of Drug Control, and it is listed among the top ten centers certified to provide adequate and proper services. The Center has sufficient funds to maintain and operate the vehicle, particularly with the savings from not having to pay for private transportation.

The \$16,000 in funds, to purchase the van was forwarded by The Rotary Foundation to Lithuania on December 31, 2009. The van will display the Rotary Seal, and indicate the continued cooperation between the Alexandria and Kauno Tauras Rotary Clubs.

The Rotary Foundation Responds to Haiti Tragedy

Donor Advised Fund Established by The Rotary Foundation to Aid in Haiti Earthquake Relief Efforts

All Rotarians continue to pray for the people of Haiti in the aftermath of a devastating earthquake that hit the country on January 12. The United Nations estimates that more than half of the buildings in the small island-nation's capital, Port au Prince, have collapsed. About 200,000 people are believed dead, and hundreds of thousands more remain homeless. As Haiti continues to dig out from this tragedy, The Rotary Foundation has established the [Haiti Earthquake Relief Fund](#), a donor advised fund primarily for U.S. Rotarians who want to donate toward emergency relief efforts. The fund has raised more than \$48,000

so far. A one-time \$5 donation to the Haiti Earthquake Relief Fund can be made by using your cell phone to text [ROTARY to 90999](#). ShelterBox has already deployed 10,000 ShelterBox containers with tents and survival supplies, making Haiti its largest relief effort within the past four years. Rotary's \$200 Million Challenge Passes Half-Way Mark

Sustained Support Needed for Rotary's Global Polio Eradication Initiative

As of 31 December, \$105 million has been raised for Rotary's \$200 Million Challenge. Achievement of the fundraising milestone was announced in December by Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Glenn E. Estess, Sr. "In the face of difficult economic times, Rotarians are heartily commended for their steadfast commitment and resourcefulness in reaching this milestone of support for global polio eradication," said Estess. "Rotary's challenge ends 30 June 2012. Let's push confidently ahead to reach our goal and help ensure that all the children of the world will be forever safe from this devastating disease."

Back when Rotary launched PolioPlus in 1988, wild poliovirus was endemic in more than 125 countries on five continents, paralyzing more than 1000 children every day. In 1988, World Health Organization voted to join Rotary in its global initiative. The Global Polio Eradication Initiative, spearheaded by national governments, the World Health Organization, Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and UNICEF, is the single-largest, internationally-coordinated public health project the world

has ever known. Since 1988, more than two billion children around the world have been immunized against polio thanks to the unprecedented cooperation of more than 200 countries and 20 million volunteers, backed by an international investment of more than \$5 billion, of which Rotarians have donated nearly twenty percent.

Rotarians and non-Rotarians in the United States can help support polio eradication by texting POLIO to 90999. A one-time donation of \$5 will be added to your mobile phone bill or deducted from your prepaid balance. You will also receive up to 1 message per day from The Rotary Foundation Alerts. All charges are billed by and payable to your mobile service provider. Service is available on most carriers. Rotary Peace Centers Update

Trustees Adopt Changes to Masters and Certificate Programs and Application Process

At their January 2010 meeting, the Foundation Trustees adopted [changes to the programs and application process](#) for the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution.

The colloquial name is now Rotary Peace Centers, and fellows are referred to as Rotary Peace Fellows. Applicants may no longer apply for both the certificate program and the Masters degree program.

Former Ambassadorial Scholars and former



certificate program participants must wait three years from the completion of those programs before being eligible for the Masters degree program. Graduates of the Masters degree program are not eligible to apply for the certificate program. All applicants must use a [new 2011 application](#), which must be submitted by each district's committee to TRF by July 1 of each year (District 7610's deadline for applications is May 14). TRF will no longer accept applications using the old form.

Club Presidents-Elect Will Set New Annual Giving Goals for Clubs at PETS

Club goal setting is vital to annual giving and the Every Rotarian, Every Year effort in building sustained support for The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund, the primary source of funding for the Foundation's programs.

Setting a goal that is specific, manageable, and achievable will instill your club's members with motivation and commitment, increasing the likelihood the goal will be met. It's a way to help every Rotarian understand how vital his or her support is to carrying out the Foundation's mission of improving health, supporting education, and alleviating poverty.

In 2010-2011, each club will be encouraged to stretch their capabilities. Every club will be encouraged to become a 100% Sustaining Member Club, in which each member donates at least \$100 every year. Each club also will be encouraged to set a goal that equates to

\$200 per capita, which is about fifty-five cents per member, per day.

As the presidents-elect training seminars take place, be sure that your club sets its 2010-11 annual giving goal as soon as possible and sends it to your district governor-elect. The [2010-11 Fund Development Club Goal Report Form is available online](#), and copies of the form will be distributed at PETS. The club goal and percentage of goal achieved will appear on the District Monthly Contribution Report.

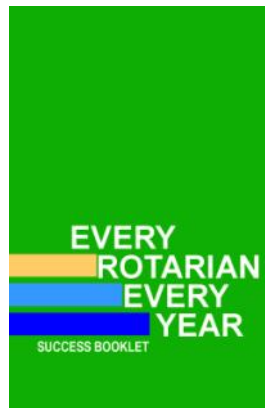

Giving to TRF's Annual Programs Fund Sharply Declines

District on Target to Set Annual Giving Record, If Rate of Donations is Maintained Through June 2010

Prior to January, District 7610 had been on-target to set an Annual Giving record, based on the rate of giving during the first six months of the Rotary Year (July through December). However, in January, contributions to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund fell eighty-eight percent (88%). While some of this reduction in giving can be attributed to December's traditionally being a high volume month for contributions due to the end of the tax year, District 7610 has never previously experienced such a dramatic one-month decline in contributions. If that trend continues, Annual Giving will fall short of the District's all-time record giving in 2007-2008 by almost \$35,000.
