cLean Rotary Club Has Something to Crow About. Momentum has been building at the McLean Club, which is completing its best Rotary Foundation Annual Giving Campaign ever! The club surpassed its annual giving goal in December, and now appears to be on the verge of completing the year with a total annual giving of more than \$26,500, a sum in excess of \$500 per capita and more than double the previous year's annual giving. More than \$10,000 was donated in the last six weeks of the term. More than 90 percent of the clubs' 71 members will be Sustaining Members this year, giving \$100 or more to the Rotary Foundation—and the club is quickly closing in on its goal of becoming a 100% Sustaining Member and 100% Paul Harris Fellows Club. During the year, the club quadrupled the number of its Paul Harris Society Members, who donate \$1,000 annually—from 3 to 12! The club grew by a net 16 new members during the year and had 16 new Paul Harris Fellows, capitalizing on a matching program through the use of the club's accumulated Recognition Points. Additionally, eight more members became multiple Paul Harris Fellows.

Incoming Club President Scott Mills, who served on the club's Foundation committee, reports, "The key elements to our success have been:

- 1. Club President Bob Hahne was not afraid to challenge us to set our goals higher than we thought we might be able to reach. He inspired us, and he led by example. Once we met our annual goal in December, we set a challenge goal that was three times the original goal, and we'll surpass that goal, also.
- 2. We made a list, and we worked the list. We identified all potential PHS, PHF, and Major Donors, and we worked the list by personally speaking to each prospective donor. Donating money is a personal thing. President Bob called each member who had not given through the club's dues check off/invoice option and asked them either to become a Paul Harris Society member, Paul Harris Fellow, or to help the club reach its 100% Sustaining Member goal by giving at least \$100 to the Rotary Foundation.
- 3. We made giving easy. Several times each year, we personally handed each member a TRF donor form with that member's name, RI donor number, club number, and district number already on the form, accompanied by a self-addressed envelope to the Foundation's NEW mailing address.
- 4. President Bob personally acknowledged and thanked each new donor, and we had special ceremonies for PHF and PHS members.
- 5. Above all else, we remembered that an informed giver is a generous giver. We educated our members about why it is important to give to the Rotary Foundation. We reminded them about how our service projects had benefited from Matching and District Simplified Grants, scholarships, GSE teams, and other programs that are funded by their donations. We told them how Rotary benefits from their donation and how our club will benefit by having more financial resources available for humanitarian and educational programs in the future. Essentially, the Rotary Foundation became *our* foundation, and in the process, more and more of our members made the Rotary Foundation their personal charity of choice."

Scott does give one warning: "Don't start too late in the year before you begin to personally call each member who has not yet become a Sustaining Member. With all the end-of-year activities that a club must perform, you can easily run out of time without proper planning." CONGRATULATIONS – McLEAN ROTARIANS!

Because of you, your contributions provided cataract operations for 30 blind individuals in India; prosthetic limbs for 25 disabled people in Thailand/Cambodia; four scholarships for needy hearing-impaired children to attend the Institute of Deaf Children in Cartagena Colombia; a deep bore well in India which supplies clean drinking water to more than 300 people; materials to treat and prevent parasites and anemia in needy children in Uruguaiana, RS, Brazil.

Foundation program participants serve as goodwill ambassadors not just when they're abroad, but also when they return to their home countries as alumni. They are already more familiar with Rotary than the average prospective club member, and their participation in Rotary's programs indicates that they are interested in our organization's objectives. Considering the large number of new alumni each year, Rotary/TRF has tremendous growth potential, especially if these alumni were more effectively transitioned into Rotary clubs.

**Current Status of Alumni in Rotary.** According to research conducted in 2005-06 by the Membership Development Division of Rotary International, only 2.9% of current Rotarians are program alumni. Additionally

- 58% of clubs say they don't recruit program alumni for membership.
- 22% of clubs claim to recruit alumni *and* actually have alumni as members.
- 84% of current program participants are interested in joining a Rotary club.
- 60% of program alumni are interested in joining a Rotary club.

mbassadorial Scholar Emily Reynolds Pierce works with three other Ambassadorial scholars to organize Project Patagonia – an effort designed to help rural schools in the Patagonia region of southern Argentina. We discussed several service ideas and concluded that fostering education was a goal about which we all felt passionate and that also promoted Rotary International's goals of fighting poverty, increasing cross-cultural understanding, and promoting world peace. After doing research and talking to local Rotarians we discovered that many public schools in Argentina are desperately lacking basic supplies, in addition to lacking more fundamental resources such as books, reference materials, and computers. We also learned that many rural schools are responsible for providing the majority of their students' daily caloric-intake through three free meals each day: breakfast, lunch

and a snack. Because of the high rates of unemployment in the region, many students only attend school in order to be fed. We realized that this was an area where we could make a tangible impact on the quality of education for many students by providing them with the resources they need to continue their schooling.

The other Ambassadorial Scholars and I began working closely with Rotary Club of Puerto Madero in Buenos Aires to coordinate efforts with the rural schools. President Fernando Armesto of Puerto Madero graciously accepted to be our Rotary advisor for the project. When I contacted my sponsor District 7610, I received immediate positive feedback. Through the incredible leadership of Rotarian George Layne and President Taras Raggio of the Gainesville-Haymarket Rotary Club, we registered Project Patagonia with Barbara Wiczek as a Rotary International World Community Service (WCS) project. To date, our project has received approximately 9,000 USD through WCS and direct donations from 44 clubs in four Rotary Districts in the United States.

The Ambassadorial Scholars are also developing a workshop for the kids to teach them the basic skills necessary to use their new resources. The goal with respect to the Niñas de Ayouma School is to fulfill the project's vision of creating a library, with some multimedia elements, as well as provide additional support for their cafeteria. Christopher and I will visit and carry out cultural exchanges with *both* schools during the second trip.

Are We There Yet? Polio is ALMOST eradicated, but your help is still needed and you can help through PolioPlus Partners-2007-2008. Plan now to go on a National Immunization Day (NID). Trips will be in November, December or January, 2007-08. There may be several trips available and you can have a choice of country and dates. All trips will be led and arrangements made by PDG Dave Groner or Barbara Groner who have led 18 NID trips. Your help is needed to educate and motivate Rotarians to continue our effort and to raise funds for PolioPlus Partners for these NIDs. The persona cost to participate in an NID is approximately \$4,000 per person. Typically, trips to India are 10 days, 7 days touring and 3

he Mean Season. Niger, the world's poorest nation, sits on the edge of the ever-encroaching Sahara desert. There's only a thin strip of fertile land here; the rest consists of rock, red dirt, or desert sand. Each year, Niger suffers a season of hunger, when all the grain has been consumed but the harvest hasn't come in yet. And each year, the country slides even further into poverty. In September 2005, a food crisis struck the vulnerable nation. Nearly a third of the country's 12 million people faced starvation. The situation remains alarming, a visiting UNICEF official reported. Most of the world has long since moved on to other crises. But not Rotary. In 2005-06, Rotarians worldwide contributed more than US\$700,000 for humanitarian efforts in

The Lost Generation. In the verdant, rolling hills of South Africa KwaZulu-Natal province, you can cross from a world of cafes and shopping malls to one of utter despair and poverty in a matter of minutes. This is also the epicenter of the HIV/AIDS epidemic. The disease kills more than 800 South Africans each day. Most are young adults in the prime of life, leaving a generation of orphans behind. There will be 40 million AIDS orphans in sub-Saharan Africa by 2010, according to USAID estimates. Rotarians in South Africa are partnering with major shoe companies to rebuild impoverished AIDS-affected communities by starting with the youngest victims. Through Soul of Africa, shoe companies are funding the bricks and mortar to

build new preschools, and Rotarians are funding equipment and teacher training. Click here to view the photo essay.


