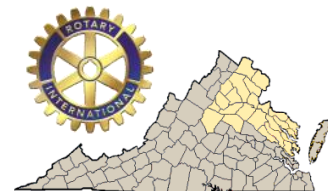

URGENT: Please Donate Today to the Annual Program Fund **Annual Giving for April and May at historic lows; funding for projects is in jeopardy.**

The assistance of every Rotarian in District 7610 is urgently needed today. To get District 7610 back on target to meet this year's Challenge Goal, **we ask all Rotarians to make an immediate contribution today of \$100 to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund.**

Clubs should send their Annual Programs Fund contributions to The Rotary Foundation as soon as possible. **Please do not wait. Twenty-eight clubs have not met annual giving goals that were set by those clubs (see page 11), representing \$73,000 in donations that were pledged, but not yet received, this year.**

During April and May, our district experienced historic lows in giving to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund. Our district finished eighth in per capita giving in the world last year, being the first district ever in Zone 33 to exceed \$200 per capita. **We started this year Number One in per capita giving in the United States, but we have fallen to 59th place worldwide.** Last year we finished the year with gifts of \$454,000 to annual giving. **This year, we have not yet met our clubs' very modest goals of \$336,000, leaving us almost \$120,000 short of last year's giving.**

Club and individual contributions to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund dropped to a near all-time low for the month of April, to just over \$13,000. Contributions for the month of May are down more than \$30,000 compared to the same period last year. Donations for April and May last year were more than \$90,000, this year they were barely over \$40,000. In real terms, the projected drop in funding equates to a loss of two Ambassadorial Scholars, our District's entire budget for Simplified Grants and funding for several Matching Grants. **Without additional donations today, we will have substantially fewer dollars available to help finance club service projects in 2013-2014.**

Please share this urgent message with all Rotarians in your club. Please impress upon them all the good work we, as Rotarians, can accomplish if we meet this year's Challenge Goal of \$225 to

the Annual Programs Fund. **Currently, we are \$71.00 per capita short of our Challenge Goal.**

Clubs are encouraged to immediately send all contributions collected from their members using a [Multiple Donor Form](#). Please do not wait until the end of June to send these contributions. When you send the contribution, mail the contribution with a postal delivery confirmation, or maybe even consider sending the donations by overnight or expedited-delivery courier. This is your best way of ensuring your club's contributions are received and posted this Rotary Year.

Individual Rotarians can make a telephone credit card contribution by calling The Rotary Foundation Contact Center at 1-866-9ROTARY (866-976-8279), or they can make an online contribution through [Rotary International's annual giving portal](#). Donors also may contribute by mail using a [Global Contribution Form](#) or by fax using the [credit card contribution form](#).

Please contribute today so that all of our clubs can serve tomorrow with the financial support of The Rotary Foundation.

Rotarians Who Give Today Help Rotary Clubs Serve Tomorrow

Thank you! Your contributions are helping to change the world.

Each Rotary year our participation in The Rotary Foundation's humanitarian and educational programs is a result of the dedication and financial support provided by Rotarians who make a commitment to The Rotary Foundation.

This year your District Designated Funds (DDF) supported matching grants that provided a mini-bus to transport medical patients in Ukraine, dug water wells in Zambia, purchased physical rehabilitation equipment for the handicapped in Brazil, delivered incubators for premature babies in rural hospitals in Ukraine, completed a water distribution system for a village in Cameroon, installed kitchen and laundry equipment for an orphanage in Ukraine, and provided oral health education and screening camps for Nepal.

Nearly 40 clubs participated in 20 District Simplified Grants totaling \$39,000, which were used to support community and international projects and programs.

We nominated a Rotary Peace Fellow candidate, and we supported two Ambassadorial Scholars this year. Earlier this year, we also interviewed several candidates for Ambassadorial Scholarships for the 2011-12 academic year, selecting Jasmine Wilkins, sponsored by RC Fair Lakes, who will study in Ecuador, and Andrea Washington, sponsored by RC Vienna, who will study in South Africa.

In April we made new friendships with the Group Study Exchange team members from District 3870 in the Philippines.

Total contributions to the \$200 Million Challenge to end Polio are over \$315,000 and we have contributed \$32,000 in DDF during this period.



You continue to provide strong financial support to annual giving. Based on year-to-date contributions and our giving history in May and June, we should be close to exceeding our record of \$207 per capita, set last year. Thanks to your generosity, our clubs and fellow Rotarians will have the financial support to serve our neighbors in need, whether they live around the corner or half-way around the world.

Your donations this year are providing Rotarians with the resources for Building Communities – Bridging Continents. Thank you!

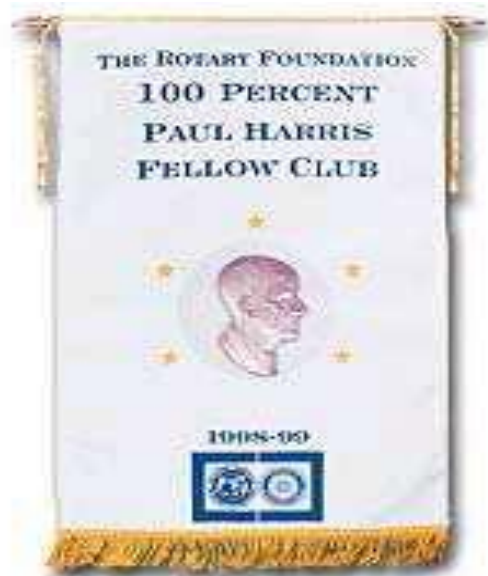
Congratulations! McLean & Bailey's Crossroads are 100% PHF Clubs Again!

Group Study Exchange Offers Exciting Opportunities

GSE Committee seeks applicants interested in four-week cultural and vocational exchange trip to Korea in 2012.

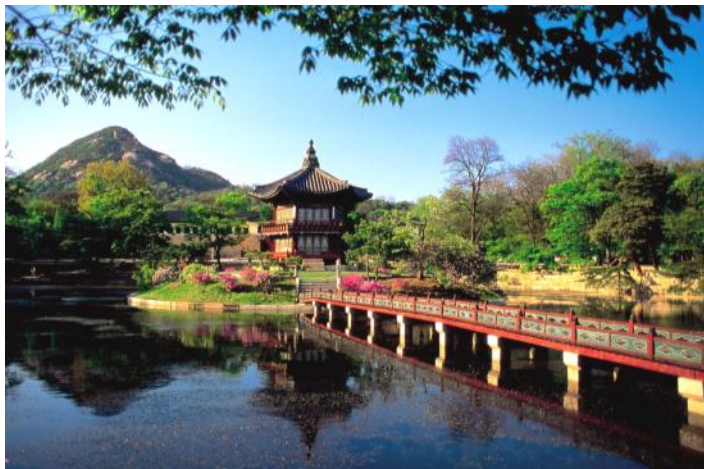
The Rotary Foundation's Group Study Exchange (GSE) Program is a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for businesspeople and professionals between the ages of twenty-five and forty who are in the early stages of their careers. During the 2011-12 Rotary Year, The Rotary Foundation will provide a GSE travel grant for a team from District 7610 to exchange a visit with District 3710 in Korea. For about thirty days, team members will experience the host country's culture and institutions, observe how their vocations are practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas, especially about future joint projects.

In a typical four-week tour, an exchange team participates in five full days of vocational visits, fifteen to twenty club presentations, ten to fifteen formal visits and social events, two to three days at the district conference, three to four hours per day of cultural and site tours, and three to four hours per day of free time with host families. Clubs interested in hosting the Inbound GSE team from Korea need to submit Host Interest Forms before the September 9, 2011 deadline.



For each team member, The Rotary Foundation provides the most economical round-trip airline tickets between the home and host countries. Rotarians in the host area provide for meals, lodging, and group travel within their district.

In the 2011-2012 Rotary Year, our District 7610 will carry out an exchange with District 3710 in Korea. The Inbound Team from District 3710 will visit our District from March 5, 2012 to April 5, 2012 and return home after our District conference. Our Outbound Team will be in District 3710 from April 20, 2012 to May 20, 2012. Upon return, our Outbound Team will provide occasional reports to our clubs on their experience. Our GSE Hosting plans are expected to follow the guidelines of The Rotary Foundation as summarized above. [A summary of the program also can be found on the District 7610 website.](#)

Districts 7600 and 7610 Team Up with Washington Nationals to Strike Out Polio!

Washington Nationals offers special seating for the July 30 game with New York Mets.

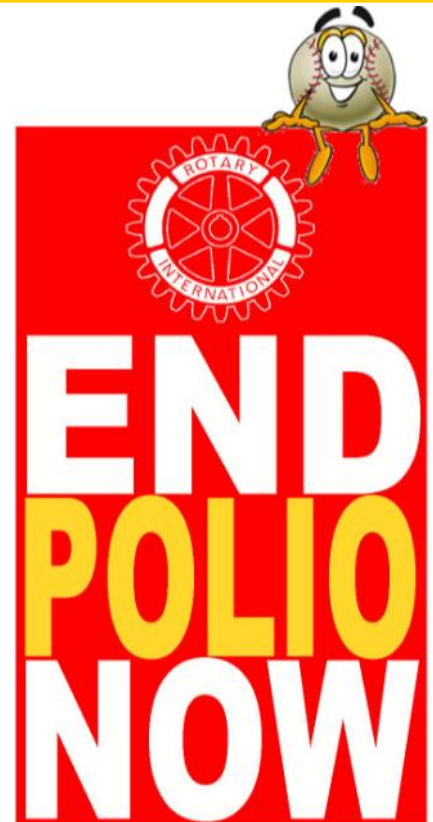
Rotary Districts 7610 and 7600 are teaming up again this season with the Washington Nationals to eradicate polio worldwide. The July 30 game versus the New York Mets has been designated as End Polio Now Night. We can participate in this special evening by purchasing tickets to the game. For each ticket sold, the Washington Nationals will contribute \$5.00 to Rotary's PolioPlus Fund to continue this important campaign we began over 30 years ago.

There again is overwhelming interest in our district to reserve blocks of seats so our clubs can enjoy the game and engage in fellowship with our closest Rotarian friends. However, to obtain blocks of seats we must have each club coordinate its ticket sales and then submit a check for bulk orders to District Treasurer John Grzejka. Clubs can reserve either Left Field Mezzanine (\$30) or Left Field Baseline Reserved (\$45) seats.

Please note the following important procedures and rules:

- Club checks for tickets should be made out to "Rotary District 7610" and sent to District Treasurer John Grzejka at 9389 Cloudberry Way, Manassas, VA, 20110 (No credit card transactions).
- Tickets will be distributed to clubs at upcoming district events as they become available. No tickets will be left at will call for pick up.
- All club checks for orders must be received no later than June 30.
- Orders made after the deadline must go through the link provided by the Washington Nationals (These orders are subject to service fees and are not part of the Rotary District 7610 block of seats).
- No refunds or exchanges once any order is placed.

TRF Quick Tip: How to Ensure Donations Post Before June 30!

Five tips to ensure your contributions are credited during the current Rotary Year.

Every year, thousands of dollars in contributions arrive late and are not posted to the Rotary year in which the donor intended to make the contribution. Here are six quick tips to ensure your donation is posted on time to your club's annual giving total: Only contributions to the Annual Programs Fund will credit towards your club's per capita and annual giving goal.

1. Mail early. *REALLY* early. Postmark your contribution, accompanied by a [Global Contribution Form](#), before June 10 (the address is on the form). Mail via USPS *delivery confirmation*. It's cheaper than overnight courier or certified mail. Donations must be postmarked before midnight June 30, and must be received by July 5.

2. Make an [online contribution](#) by credit card.
3. Fax a completed [credit card contribution form](#) to The Rotary Foundation. Fax by Noon on June 30.
4. Call The Rotary Foundation Contact Center toll-free at 1-866-9ROTARY (866-976-8279) to make a credit card contribution. The Contact Center's lines are typically very busy in June. To avoid a delay, make your telephone contribution before June 20.
5. Enroll in [TRF-Direct](#) for next year's contributions, and you'll avoid having to bother with this ever again!

Doing Good in... **CAMEROON**

Little girls everywhere like to play dress-up. In the Village of Wum, Cameroon, they once worried whether they would have clean water to drink. But, Charlottesville Rotarian Tom Dunnells believed that parents in Wum should not have to watch the village cemetery fill with the bodies of little children who died each year due to filthy drinking water. With designs from engineering students at the University of Virginia, Tom helped organize a multi-year, multi-club project to bring clean mountain spring water to the Village of Wum. The project was funded by Matching Grants from The Rotary Foundation and by donations from Every Rotarian, Every Year.

District Simplified Grants Allow Rotary Clubs to Assist Neighbors in Need

Grants of up to \$1,000 available to assist clubs with Community and International projects.

The District Simplified Grant (“DSG”) program supports community and international service activities and humanitarian endeavors in which clubs in our District 7610 wish to engage. DSGs are funded solely by District Designated Funds, which are funds that result from our contributions to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund, and, true to its name, each district gets to set broad guidelines each year. The total for District Simplified Grants for the 2011-12 year will be \$33,900. Remember, it is your contributions to the Annual Fund that make up the DSG funds – and we thank you for your support.

How do I apply, and what's the process? Applications are to be submitted between July 1 and August 15, 2011. Please submit the completed and properly signed DSG Application to [Joseph A. Akkara](#), Chair for D7610 Simplified Grants.



What are the criteria for District 7610 Simplified Grant? In addition to the eligibility criteria that apply to ALL Rotary International grants, our District has set the following guidelines for RY 2011-12. This year, each Rotary Club in District 7610 may apply for DSG of up to \$1,000, for a new community service project or for an international humanitarian project. We encourage you to get together with other Clubs in your community to put your resources together. Please note the Club cost-sharing eligibility requirement of \$100, which applies to each club in the case of cooperative projects.” It is detailed below.

Please survey your community to see what needs exist. Almost any project may have an element of humanitarian value, but consideration will be given to the extent of active Rotarian participation in developing and maintaining the project, the population and benefit to those served, the value to the community, and the project's potential to increase the ability of groups or individuals to better participate in their society.

New for this year's District Simplified Grant Application is a \$100.00 per award cost-sharing by the sponsoring Club

irrespective of the amount requested or awarded. This cost sharing amount should be clearly identified in the project budget of the DSG Application.

What are some of the issues when designing the project?

Project Final Report must be completed by May 1, 2012: DSG project must be completed within one year. For our District, we request that Final Report be submitted by May 1, 2012.

Project must be new: DSG project must be a new project, and not a project that your Club has done in the past, or has been doing annually. For example, if you received DSG for a project last year, you cannot use the same project this year. However, in another example, you may have helped with distribution of math books to a school a few years ago, but this year's proposed project will distribute English dictionaries this year to the same school – such a project would be considered “new.” Please note however, that you may find a “new project” within the framework of an existing, ongoing, annual event. For example, you may hold a Dictionary Distribution during your annual community festival. That specific project would be considered new, even though it takes place within the bigger context of an annual event sponsored by your Club.

Project must involve ACTIVE Rotarian participation: funds cannot be used as pass-through to another organization. Rotarians must be actively engaged in various phases of the project. This may include project planning, item purchasing, execution of other parts of the project, publicity efforts, etc. The project must not be a simple pass-through, whereby grant funds are simply awarded to another organization.

Project must NOT fund the following:

- Building of any structures (houses, schools, work places, etc.), or any structures attached to such structures (hoses, plumbing, electricity lines, etc.);
- Administrative expenses of another organization;
- Stipends of any kind; or
- International travel costs (plane tickets, train tickets, etc.).

Each participating Rotary Club must file a separate Progress Report by January 1, 2012 and a Final Report by May 1, 2012.

World Leaders Recommit to the Goal of Global Eradication of Polio

May meetings of world leaders focus need for greater financial resolve to close \$665 million funding gap.

G8 Reaffirms Commitment to Eradicate Polio: The Heads of State of the G8 countries unanimously declared their commitment to polio eradication at this year's G8 Summit in Deauville, France, on 26-27 May. In its declaration, the G8 reaffirmed their intention to complete the job of polio eradication: "We stress our continuing commitment to the eradication of polio," the statement read. "Our past support has contributed to the 99% decrease of polio cases in the developing countries. We flag the need for a special focus on this issue and renewed momentum. To this end, we will continue to support the Global Polio Eradication Initiative."

Independent Monitoring Board Report: The Independent Monitoring Board (IMB), a body set up at the request of the World Health Assembly to independently monitor progress towards a polio-free world, published a sobering report. While affirming the effectiveness of the new Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) Strategic Plan 2010-2012 launched 12 months ago, the IMB expressed serious concern that remaining operational gaps in key infected countries are undermining progress. The IMB also identified a global funding gap of US\$665 million through 2012 as the "single greatest threat to the GPEI's success."

World Health Assembly: Delegates at the World Health Assembly (WHA) met May 16-24 in Geneva and focused on the "significant advances" since the launch of a new strategic plan and new, bivalent oral poliovirus vaccine in 2010. In India and Nigeria, the source of all importations of wild poliovirus into previously polio-free countries in recent years, polio cases declined by 95% between 2009 and 2010; during the same period polio cases due to the type 3 virus declined by 92% globally.

Delegates called for strong national and sub-national leadership by political authorities for the implementation of polio eradication strategies and highlighted the need for countries to significantly strengthen routine immunization.

Delegates expressed particular concern over the funding gap of US\$ 665 million to fully carry out polio eradication activities in 2011 and 2012. Several

delegates called for levels of political and financial commitment to be sustained until the job is done, reminding the Assembly of the estimated minimum financial benefits of eradication over the next 25 years of US\$ 40-50 billion, primarily to low-income countries.

Bill Gates, Co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, was one of the keynote speakers at the Assembly. He reminded global health leaders that the long fight to end polio "demonstrates that technology is only as effective as the leaders delivering it." He challenged health authorities to reach every child with vaccine and donors to fund the final steps of polio eradication.

RI Convention: Speaking at the Rotary International Convention in New Orleans, Bill Gates, Co-Chair of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, praised Rotary for its continued success in the effort to eradicate polio, but cautioned that Rotarians will need to redouble their efforts to finish the disease once and for all. He noted that he and his wife, Melinda, have made eradicating polio their foundation's top priority.

United Nations Governor's Forum: Ban Ki-moon, Secretary-General of the United Nations, told a meeting of the Governors' Forum in Abuja, Nigeria, "you have made tremendous progress [in] the past year. Polio cases are down by 95 per cent. But, if we let our guard down for a minute, polio can spring back. We cannot let this happen. Let us eradicate this crippling disease once and for all."
