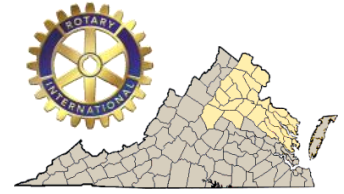

Four Borehole Wells Bring Clean Water to Schools in Zambia

Dulles International Airport Club completes its eleventh borehole water project.

The Dulles Rotary Club recently completed four clean water boreholes at four different schools in the Copper Belt District of the Republic of Zambia.

In April 2010, Scott Didericksen, Andrew Wade, Lee Johnson, and Margaret Wade traveled to Ndola, Zambia to oversee the progress of another water project. The due diligence trip not only was to inspect the wells that had recently been completed, but to review possible projects for the 2010 – 2011 Rotary year.

As a result of the trip, the group identified four suitable school locations for additional borehole drilling: Elohim Community, Maposa Basic, Mansansa Community, and Kakumba (south) Basic. Each school provided an interesting story.

Elohim Community School was meeting in an "open-air" room with only a few branches as a makeshift roof. Maposa Basic had a dirty shallow well that recently had begun to collapse. Mansansa had a contaminated well that no longer was in use, forcing the students to use a nearby-polluted river as their primary drinking water source. Kakumba Basic (south) boasted a brand new building, but still lacked a decent source of drinking water for its students.



As of March 2011, each of the four schools has a new borehole water well. Because they are located in remote rural areas, where electricity generally is unavailable, unreliable, or

accessible only at a high cost, each was equipped with a hand pump. These new water systems require no electricity, which reduces maintenance costs and improves the sustainability of the projects.

Seeds of Hope International Partnerships was the contractor for the four recent boreholes.



With the addition of these four borehole wells, Dulles International Airport Rotary Club has provided clean water at eleven different schools, thanks to three separate Matching Grants from The Rotary Foundation. The first borehole was completed in 2007-2008. A fourth Matching Grant will be undertaken with clubs in the Water Alliance during the 2011 - 2012 Rotary year. All of grants received substantial financial support from Rotary District 7610, thanks to Rotarians' contributions to the Annual Programs Fund.

"Throughout this effort, the Luanshya Rotary Club has been a reliable and welcomed partner. They have helped with the logistics of identifying locations, surveying sites, and overseeing the progress of projects, just a few of the many aspects of getting clean water to people that need it," said Andrew Wade, one of the program administrators for the Dulles club.

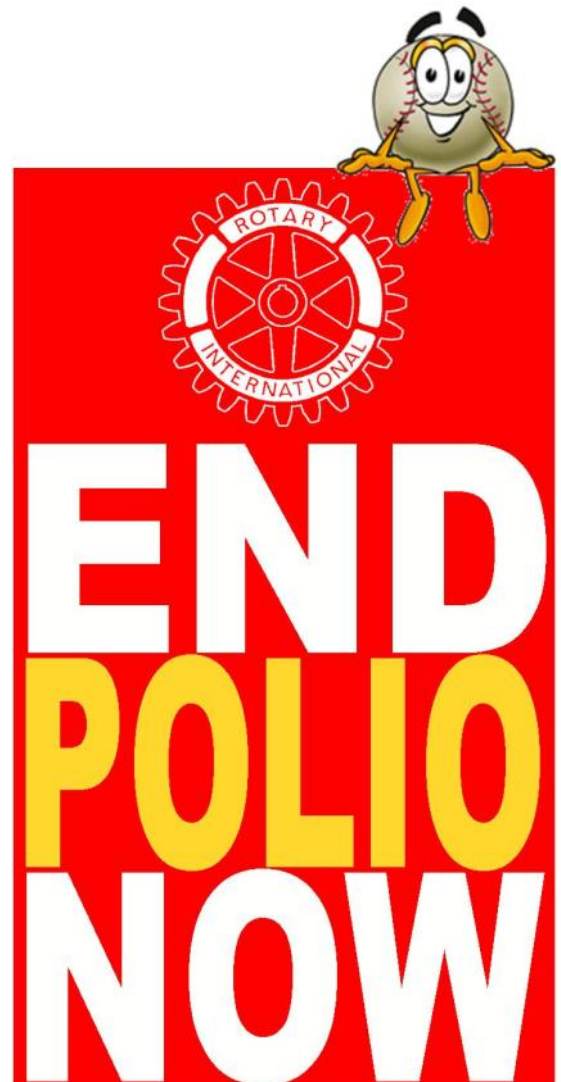
Rotary Districts 7610 and 7600 are teaming up again this season with the Washington Nationals to eradicate polio worldwide. The July 30 game versus the New York Mets has been designated as End Polio Now Night. We can participate in this special evening by purchasing tickets to the game. For each ticket sold, the Washington Nationals will contribute \$5.00 to Rotary's PolioPlus Fund to continue this important campaign we began over 30 years ago.

There again is overwhelming interest in our district to reserve blocks of seats so our clubs can enjoy the game and engage in fellowship with our closest Rotarian friends. However, to obtain blocks of seats we must have each club coordinate its ticket sales and then submit a check for bulk orders to District Treasurer John Grzejka. Clubs can reserve either Left Field Mezzanine (\$30) or Left Field Baseline Reserved (\$45) seats.

Please note the following important procedures and rules:

- Club checks for tickets should be made out to "Rotary District 7610" and sent to District Treasurer John Grzejka at 9389 Cloudberry Way, Manassas, VA, 20110 (No credit card transactions) .
- Tickets will be distributed to clubs at upcoming district events as they become available. No tickets will be left at will call for pick up.
- All club checks for orders must be received no later than June 30 .
- Orders made after the deadline must go through the link provided by the Washington Nationals (These orders are subject to service fees and are not part of the Rotary District 7610 block of seats) .
- No refunds or exchanges once any order is placed.

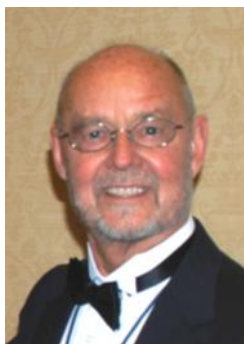

McLean Rotarian Frank Peterson Receives RI Service Above Self Award

Peterson recognized for life-long service to his nation and for his humanitarian efforts in Guatemala.

McLean Rotarian and Co-Founder and President of Partner for Surgery, Frank Peterson, was awarded Rotary International's highest honor, the *Service Above Self Award*, during the Governor's Banquet at the annual District Conference in Gettysburg on April 9, 2011. The *Service Above Self Award* recognizes those outstanding few who have indeed made service a way of life. Only 150 or fewer individuals receive the *Service Above Self Award* each year.

Frank Peterson attended the University of California, Berkeley, graduating in 1961 with a BS degree in Mechanical Engineering. He received a Masters Degree and in 1966 a PhD from Northwestern University. After college he came to Washington, DC to work for the Navy. He headed a division at the David Taylor Model Basin, Carderock, MD, which designed submarines including the Trident. One of the foremost authorities in his field, Frank met yearly with world leaders from China, Russia, European and other countries. Frank married his college sweetheart, Linda. They had three children who in turn have blessed them with four grandchildren. Frank and Linda have been very active in charitable activities over the past 45 years, including the establishment of a farming cooperative for rural Halifax County in VA, a homeless shelter for women in DC (N Street Village), the settlement of Vietnamese refugees into the United States, and other activities at their church.

Frank has been active in different roles in the Rotary Club of McLean's International Service and Rotary Foundation Committees. He has worked closely with Rotary Clubs in Guatemala, Minnesota, Hawaii, Virginia and California in managing the implementation of several Matching Grants from The Rotary Foundation. These grants acquired surgical supplies for use by more than 55 North American medical teams that go to Guatemala to triage and treat patients identified by PfS from the rural, native Mayan population. Another matching grant for \$49,000 was used to ship two overseas containers of equipment for two operating room suites in a rural Guatemalan clinic. In that grant Frank worked with other charitable organizations that refurbish surgical equipment from US hospitals and obtained close to \$1 million in equipment. Another grant, which Frank helped administer for the McLean Club acquired a four-wheel drive vehicle for the PfS triage events and logistical support in rural Guatemala.

Frank was moved to organize PfS by the Peace Corps experience of his son, Todd, who served in Guatemala. Frank became aware of the desperate need for proper medical care in

rural, Mayan communities. He concluded that the overriding barrier was lack of infrastructure between prospective patients and medical practitioners eager to help them. Frank took early retirement from the Navy in 2001 and set about overcoming those barriers by founding and directing PfS. Through his work, Frank enables impoverished people in rural Guatemalan villages to access appropriate medical care. His work provides a bridge between them and volunteer multi-national medical teams, providing medical attention to over 40,000 people during approximately 55 medical triage missions. From those triage events approximately 6,500 people have received surgeries. In addition approximately 5,000 women have received cervical cancer screenings.

Frank volunteers over 40 hours a week working on PfS matters while at home in the U.S., and many more hours each week while in Guatemala, where he spends half his time, organizing and administering medical missions and triage events. Frank has committed his remaining life to meeting the critical health needs of the indigent Mayan people of rural Guatemala villages.

At a celebration of the 8th anniversary of PfS's founding, Guatemala's Ambassador to the U.S., Francisco Villagran de Leon, said, "I want to add my public 'thank you' to the thousands of private expressions of appreciation that Partner for Surgery has received from people in my country whose lives have been transformed by this humanitarian organization."

Each student's time abroad provides the chance to enrich the individual's academic and cultural awareness,

while promoting international goodwill and understanding throughout the global community.

Your club can help make a difference in the life of a promising student by nominating a candidate for one of the two Ambassadorial Scholarships that will be offered for the academic year coinciding with Rotary Year 2012-13.

New Rotary Peace Center Selected in Sweden.

District 7610 extends deadline for clubs to nominate Rotary Peace Fellowship candidates for 2012 academic year.



Foundation Trustee Chair and former RI President from Sweden Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar announced that The Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees has selected [Uppsala University](#) in Uppsala, Sweden, to host a new Rotary Center for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution. "We are excited about this new partnership with Uppsala University to take the Rotary Peace Centers program to the next level," says Stenhammar.

In 2009, the Trustees began a search for institutions that met the Foundation's requirements for a Rotary Peace Center. More than 100 received inquiries, including five finalists, received site visits between January and March, 2011. George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia, was among the five finalists.

The first class of peace fellows at Uppsala will begin their studies in September 2012. The Trustees approved an extension to the application deadline for Rotary Peace Fellowships starting in 2012. As a result of the Trustees' extension, District 7610 Peace Fellowship Chair Lester Schoene has announced the extension of

the District 7610 deadline for clubs to submit nominations for Rotary Peace Fellowship candidates. Clubs now may submit nominations through 30 June, 2011.

The Rotary Peace Centers program offers individuals the opportunity to pursue either a master's degree or certificate in studies related to peace and conflict resolution. Up to 110 fellowships are awarded annually. The existing centers are located at the University of Bradford, England; University of Queensland, Australia; International Christian University, Japan; Universidad del Salvador, Argentina; Duke University and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, USA; and Chulalongkorn University, Thailand, which offers a three-month certificate program.

More than 500 Rotary Peace Centers alumni worldwide are working with international organizations such as the World Bank, Organization of American States, and United Nations, as well as with local and national governments, nongovernmental organizations, and consulting firms.

The program receives support from donations to the Rotary Peace Centers Major Gifts Initiative. Paul A. Netzel, chair of the initiative, says it has obtained US\$55.8 million in commitments, which surpasses the phase 1 goal of \$55 million. "This is an important milestone for the Rotary Peace Centers and great timing, given the exciting announcement of the new center at Sweden's Uppsala University," says Netzel. "Now that we've reached \$55 million, we've set our sights on a goal of \$60 million by 30 June. We're well over halfway to our overall goal of \$95 million by 2015."

Annual Giving at All-Time Low for April, with Contributions Below \$15,000!

District at risk of substantially lower funding to assist club service projects in 2013-14.

District 7610 Annual Giving Chair Scott Mills reported that club and individual contributions to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund dropped to an all-time low in April to just over \$13,000. Donations for the same period last year exceeded \$35,000.

Half of all of our contributions to Annual Programs Fund are returned to District 7610 in three years in the form of District Designated Funds (DDF). This year's annual giving contributions will fund community and international service projects, scholarships, and vocational exchanges through Rotary Foundation District Grants and Global Grants under TRF's Future Vision Plan in 2013-14.

"We ask clubs and Rotarians to answer this call to action by making a donation to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund as soon as possible." PDG Travis White

"Without additional donations before June 30 this year, we will have substantially fewer dollars available from DDF to finance club service projects in 2013-14," Mills warned. "Since TRF matches dollar-for-dollar all DDF contributions to Global Grants—which will be similar to current Matching Grants—our short-fall in contributions this year will be compounded in three years due to a lower match in project funding by The Rotary Foundation. This will require clubs to contribute more to fund the same projects. And since club dollars are matched only fifty cents per dollar, it means every dollar we don't donate this year will be a loss of one dollar and fifty cents in 2013-14. That equates to a loss of more than \$33,000 in funding due to the reduction in contributions for April 2011, alone," Mills observed.

"Last year, District 7610 experienced its single-best year of giving ever—not only to The Rotary Foundation, but to the TRF Haiti Donor Advised Fund and to Shelter Box," observed District Rotary Foundation Chair and Past District Governor Travis White. "Despite a troubled economy last year, we made the financial commitment to invest in the financial recovery of our foundation and

in the recovery of people who were devastated by natural disasters. The need is just as great this year, and we ask clubs and Rotarians to answer this call to action by making a donation to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund as soon as possible," PDG White requested.

"The District's current level of APF contributions is \$309,000, which is short of our District Challenge Goal by more than \$182,500. When you calculate the potential matches from The Rotary Foundation, that equates to a loss of funding of more than \$273,750 for club community, international, and vocational service projects and scholarships, unless Rotarians in our District help us reach this year's goal," Mills said. "While thankfully two-thirds of the Rotarians in District 7610 have given something this year, the overall number of Sustaining Members—persons who give \$100 or more—has dropped to 38 percent," Mills reported.

To get District back on target to meet its challenge goal, Mills asks all District Paul Harris Society Members to make their annual contributions as soon as possible, and he encourages all Rotarians to help the district meet its Challenge Goal of reaching per capita giving of \$225.81 this year.

Only four clubs currently report 100% participation among all members this year. District 7610 currently has only one 100% EREY club, compared to last year when District 7610 had 21 clubs that were 100% EREY Clubs (i.e., every member gives something and the club has per capita giving of \$100 or more).

TRF Quick Tip: Six Ways to Ensure Contributions are Posted Before June 30!

Six tips to ensure your contributions are credited during the current Rotary Year.

Every year, thousands of dollars in contributions arrive late and are not posted to the Rotary year in which the donor intended to make the contribution. Here are six quick tips to ensure your donation is posted on time to your club's annual giving total:

1. Remember: Only contributions to the Annual Programs Fund will credit towards your club's per capita and annual giving goal. Restricted giving (e.g., PolioPlus, grants, Rotary Peace Center) and Permanent Fund contributions are not credited to per capita and annual giving totals.
2. Mail early. *REALLY* early. Postmark your contribution, accompanied by a [Global Contribution Form](#), before June 10 (the address is on the form). Mail via USPS delivery confirmation. It's cheaper than overnight courier or certified mail, but just as effective. Donations must be postmarked before midnight June 30, and must be received by July 5.
3. Make an [online contribution](#) by credit card.
4. Fax a completed [credit card contribution form](#) to The Rotary Foundation. Fax by Noon on June 30.
5. Call The Rotary Foundation Contact Center, 1-866-9ROTARY (976-8279) to make a credit card contribution. The Contact Center's lines are typically very busy in June. Make your contribution before June 1.
6. Enroll in [TRF-Direct](#) for next year's contributions, and you'll avoid having to both with this ever again!

Matching Points Available to New Paul Harris Society Members

New PHS Members who enroll in TRF-Direct will receive 1,000 Recognition Points upon initial enrollment.

New PHS members may elect to enroll in [TRF-Direct](#) to make monthly or quarterly donations to TRF's Annual Programs Fund via a credit card or electronic fund transfer (EFT), in lieu of making an immediate donation of \$1,000 before becoming a Paul Harris Society Member.

Now, thanks to the generosity of a District 7610 PHS member, Recognition Points are available, allowing the District's Paul Harris Society to transfer 1,000 points immediately to each new PHS member who enrolls in TRF-Direct as the method of making the member's contribution to The Rotary Foundation.
