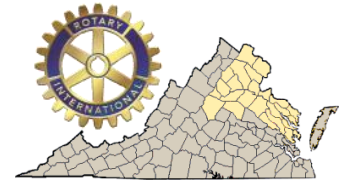

Group Study Exchange team member applications deadline extended to October 9

District 7610 is looking for a few good men and women, ages 25 to 40, to serve on a four week vocational and cultural Group Study Exchange Team to the Philippines from April 11 to May 9, 2011.

No, we're not recruiting for the Marine Corps. We're looking for young professionals who are not in Rotary who have a passion for world travel, who are interested in learning how their vocations are practiced in another country, and who would like to serve as a goodwill ambassador for Rotary District 7610. All accommodations and travel costs are paid by Rotary International and individual host Rotarians. The application deadline is October 9, 2010.



events, two to three days at the district conference, three to four hours per day of cultural and site tours, and three to four hours per day of free time with host families.

For each team member, the Foundation provides the most economical round-trip airline ticket between the home and host countries. Rotarians in the host area provide for meals, lodging, and group travel within their district. Program costs are made possible through District Designated Funds and the World Fund, thanks to contributions to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund.



Completed [applications](#) should be submitted to [GSE Chair Ronnie Chantker](#) by October 9. Applicants for the GSE Team must be available to participate in an interview on October 23. The first team training meeting will be held on November 14.

The Rotary Foundation's Group Study Exchange (GSE) program is a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for businesspeople and professionals between the ages of 25 and 40 who are in the early stages of their careers. The program provides travel grants for teams to exchange visits in paired areas of different countries. For four to six weeks, team members experience the host country's culture and institutions, observe how their vocations are practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas.

In a typical four-week tour, applicants participate in five full days of vocational visits, 15 to 20 club presentations, 10 to 15 formal visits and social

District 7610 Awards Two Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships

Applicants from Vienna and Fair Lakes Rotary Clubs awarded one-year academic scholarships

Ambassadorial Scholarships, The Rotary Foundation's oldest and best-known program, was founded in 1947. Since then, more than 40,000 men and women from about 100 nations have studied abroad under its auspices. Today it is one of the world's largest privately funded international scholarships programs. Nearly 700 scholarships were awarded for study in 2009-10. Through grants totaling approximately US\$16.2 million, recipients from about 70 countries studied in more than 80 nations.

The purpose of the Ambassadorial Scholarships program is to further international understanding and friendly relations among people of different countries and geographical areas. The program sponsors academic year scholarships for undergraduate and graduate students as well as for qualified professionals pursuing vocational studies. While abroad, scholars serve as goodwill ambassadors to the host country and give presentations about their homelands to Rotary clubs and other groups. Upon returning home, scholars share with Rotarians and others the experiences that led to a greater understanding of their host country.

Generous contributions to the Annual Programs Fund from Rotarians worldwide represent a continued faith that today's Ambassadorial Scholars will be tomorrow's community and world leaders.

Meet District 7610's newly selected Ambassadorial Scholars, Jasmine Wilkins and Andrea Washington.

Jasmine Wilkins is a former Peace Corps volunteer to Nicaragua. She speaks Spanish fluently.



A 2006 graduate of the College of William and Mary, Jasmine received her bachelor's degree in Hispanic Studies/Government. She undertook additional studies in Chilean languages and culture at Pontificia Universidad Catolica de Volparaisa in Chile.

Jasmine works for the United States Department of Agriculture as an International Agricultural Development Specialist.

She has traveled to Nicaragua, Chile, Brazil, and Dominican Republic.

Her volunteer service has included work for the Olde Towne Medical Center and as an ESL Instructor and Community Liaison in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Jasmine wants to study Economic and Community Development at the Universidad de Guayaquil in Ecuador.

Jasmine's application was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Fair Lakes.

Andrea Washington wants to study International Development at the University of Cape Town, South Africa.



A 2004 graduate of American University, she received bachelor degrees in both Spanish and International Affairs.

For the past six years, Andrea has worked for the United States Department of State as a program manager.

She has extensive international travel experience, including Liberia, Egypt, Spain, and Brazil.

Andrea is the President of the Rotaract Club of Washington, D.C. She also is a member of Toastmasters. Her volunteer activities include City of Alexandria Virginia Domestic Violence, Virginia Medical Response Corps, Department of State Civil Response Corps, and Miriam's Kitchen

Andrea's hobbies include modern dance, scuba diving, soccer, running, yoga, kayaking, playing classical music on her French horn, rollerblading, and cooking. She speaks Portuguese, Spanish, and Arabic.

District Simplified Grant Funds 20 Projects in Nine Countries

Forty-five clubs request funding \$65,535 from \$39,000 available

This year the District Simplified Grant received twenty-four requests from forty-five clubs. The total requested was \$65,535; but, the available funds were \$39,000. With a 10 percent club match, the projected club cash contributions were \$21,396. Additionally, other organizations are contributing more than \$10,000 towards project costs. There were six team projects with up to twelve clubs participating in a team. The themes of the projects include eight International projects, five literacy projects, five health related, and thirteen local community projects. The reduced amounts for projects are not to be considered a reflection on the quality of the projects. This year the DSG program received a large number of very strong competitive proposals with compelling humanitarian needs. With available funds, the program attempted to fund as many worthy projects as possible at a reduced level. The DSG program sincerely hopes that these projects could achieve overall stated goals and core humanitarian needs with the reduced funding from the DSG program. **Joseph Akkara, District Simplified Grants Chair**

Foundation Chair's Message: Success in a vocation means giving – of time, expertise, and money

People join Rotary clubs as proud representatives of their businesses or professions. Hence, all club members have an obligation to represent their vocations to fellow Rotarians and to exemplify the spirit of Rotary in the workplace.



People who are successful in their vocations often are well organized, not only in their professions but also in their private lives. Therefore, they also are well organized in their giving. They understand that if The Rotary Foundation runs a special fundraising challenge to match the generous donations from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, giving to the Annual Programs Fund remains as important as ever, as this is the core part of The Rotary Foundation's financial operations. Equally important are donations to the Permanent Fund and Rotary Centers Major Gifts Initiative. The giving to the \$200

Million Polio Challenge must be over and above the normal and regular annual giving, and fortunately many Rotarians understand this.

Donations, however, are not necessarily money only. Many, many Rotarians give of their free time and of their expertise, which so often is a result of success in their vocation. Numerous are the doctors and nurses who help sick children, numerous are the engineers who help drill wells, numerous are the teachers who help in schools – just to mention a few.

And the practice goes back to the various vocations where it all began in 1905 – a handful of gentlemen of different vocations who came together to help others. That was the beginning of what is now *Building Communities – Bridging Continents* through Service Above Self.

Celebrate World Polio Day on October 24

Two-for-one PHF recognition offered to Rotarians for contributions made on-line via [Member Access](#)

PolioPlus



Sunday, 24 October 2010 is World Polio Day as determined by the UN. Rotarians around the world are planning events in celebration of this day. In San Francisco, approximately 2,000 people are expected to

walk the Golden Gate Bridge along with RI President Ray Klinginsmith. A lighting of the Ferry Terminal with END POLIO NOW is planned for the evening.

For the week leading up to this event, The Rotary Foundation will be offering 2 for 1 recognition credit for every contribution of US\$100 or more made to polio on-line. The strategy is to encourage Rotarians to experience our on-line giving application in the hopes that they will find it simple and easy and come back to it again and again. On-line contribution processing is much less expensive than processing checks through mail, allowing more funds and resources of The Rotary Foundation to be used for programs, where they are needed most. The opportunity would be open to all Rotarians worldwide for one week.

[Vance Zavela, District 7610 PolioPlus Chair](#), encourages all Rotarians to participate if they already have completed their commitment to the Annual Programs Fund or you will make an annual giving commitment in addition to this contribution. District 7610's priority during the End Polio Now campaign has been for Rotarians to contribute to the Annual Programs Fund (APF) so we can provide District Designated Funds (DDF) for the programs in which our clubs participate, including Group Study Exchange, Ambassadorial Scholars, District Simplified Grants and Matching Grants. All clubs have been asked to raise financial support for the polio eradication effort through community fundraising and to budget an annual contribution of \$2,000, thereby allowing individual members to focus their continued financial support on the Annual Programs Fund.

If you have never registered for Members Access online at www.rotary.org, the District 7610 Rotary Foundation Committee recommends you register in advance, as it will take two or more days to obtain the password to log in and make an online contribution.
