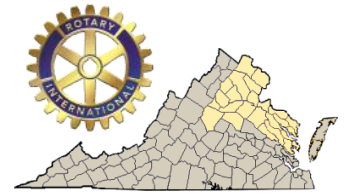

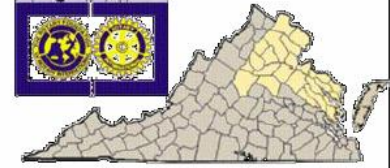

## TRF Quick Tip: Donor Advised Funds—An Alternative to Club Foundations

DAFs avoid the hassle and headaches caused by administering a separate club foundation.

If your club is considering establishing its own foundation or seeking to improve an existing foundation by reducing administrative costs and obtaining professional asset management, then The Rotary Foundation Donor Advised Fund may be for you. Your club, or any individual or group can establish a Donor Advised Fund, which can help attract contributions from Rotarians, community members, and local businesses looking for a way to:

- Receive a tax receipt for their contributions
- Contribute appreciated securities
- Contribute to an organization with professional asset management

A DAF account, started for as little as \$10,000 by a Rotary Club or Rotary-affiliated group or individual is a great way for Rotarians and supportive community members to receive immediate tax benefits for their contributions of cash and securities.\* Corporations can also contribute to a DAF account and receive tax benefits. The DAF account funds are then professionally invested and managed using four investment portfolio options to suit your group's objectives.

Once an account is funded with the initial \$10,000, account-holders can make grant recommendations to any IRS-approved charity in good standing in the United States, including a school's financial aid office. It is a great way for clubs, groups, and individuals to raise and distribute funds for local needs and scholarships, also.

If your Rotary club has considered creating a charitable foundation to provide tax-exempt support for its charitable interests, then you should seriously consider the TRF DAF as a cost-effective and efficient alternative. Forming a separate charitable foundation requires you to comply with an array of federal and state laws to establish and maintain its nonprofit status. See [www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov) for more details.

Alternatively, opening an DAF account is inexpensive and requires only a simple form for an [individual](#) or a [group](#). Once the DAF account is in place, The Rotary Foundation assumes responsibility for the fund's administration, freeing your time for other activities. Additional advantages of a TRF DAF account include:

- No start-up fees
- No tax or net investment gain or net capital gains
- Professionally managed portfolios
- No annual federal taxes, detailed accounting practices, or due diligence for grant distributions required on your part
- Tax receipting and grant-making management done for you
- Ability to recommend to any IRS-approved U.S. public charity in good standing
- 1% annual grant distribution automatically granted to The Rotary Foundation Annual Programs Fund, which earns Paul Harris Fellow recognition for your Rotary DAF account and helps achieve your club's Annual Programs Fund goal.

It is no wonder that The Rotary Foundation's Donor Advised Fund is quickly becoming the charitable giving vehicle of choice for so many Rotarians and Rotary-affiliated groups. TRF DAF accounts are easy to create and inexpensive to manage; they provide generous tax savings, and offer the peace of mind that comes with knowing your charitable goals are being met.

Individual and group accounts hold additional advantages by allowing the donor or club to:

- Leave a lasting legacy to The Rotary Foundation's Permanent Fund with an "Individual" account
- Name a child(ren) as a successor of an "Individual" account
- Receive multiple donor receipting for "Group" accounts
- Make contributions and grant recommendations with a single account
- Contribute complex gifts such as stock, mutual funds, and retirement plan assets.

## Polio eradication within reach, despite concerns

No new cases of Polio in India in seven months! Global partners close to eradicating Wild Polio Virus Type 3.

Among the key goals of the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#) (GPEI) is interrupting transmission of the wild poliovirus by the end of 2012. Although the GPEI [Independent Monitoring Board](#) (IMB) reported in July that this goal may be in jeopardy, it also noted signs of progress and provided several recommendations that could help get the program back on track.

The GPEI has made significant steps forward since the launch last year of its new strategic plan and the bivalent oral polio vaccine. Among the four polio-endemic countries, India has reported only one case of polio so far this year—and no new cases since January 2011. The country “is on track to interrupt transmission this year,” the [report](#) states. “The northern part of India, where most of the problem had been, hasn’t had one case in 15 months,” adds Robert S. Scott, chair of Rotary’s International PolioPlus Committee.

The other polio-endemic countries are Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. The IMB report cites good progress in Afghanistan while spotlighting the challenge of immunizing children in conflict areas. Nigeria also has been making good headway but, following elections in April, needs to sustain the political commitment required to ensure eradication of the disease.

In Pakistan, cases doubled in the first six months of 2011, compared with the same period in 2010. The report commended the country’s high-level commitment to polio eradication through its national emergency action plan, launched in January, but added that the plan needs to make a stronger impact at the local

level.

The report also expressed concern about controlling polio in countries with reestablished transmission, including Angola, Chad, and Democratic Republic of the Congo. Despite these challenges, [polio cases worldwide](#) decreased almost 50 percent during the first six months of 2011, compared with the same period in 2010.

“Type 3 polio numbers have dropped to 15 this year,” says Scott, referring to one of only two strains of the wild poliovirus that remain. “It appears type 3 will soon be eradicated completely.”

Health experts believe that eradicating polio, rather than trying to control the disease, is both feasible and essential.

“There are approximately a dozen countries where polio gets reported sporadically, and those cases can all be traced back to the four countries where transmission has continued,” says Robert Murphy, director of the Center for Global Health at Northwestern University in Illinois, USA. “If we focus on those four countries, the cases in the other countries are going to evaporate. It’s very important to finish the job soon, because we’re so close. If we back off now, the problem is going to get bigger and even more expensive.” Finishing polio once and for all, the IMB report states, will require enhanced political commitment, secure funding, and strengthened technical capacity.

“The eradication of polio is the responsibility of every government,” says Scott, noting the unanimous decision in 1988 at the World Health Assembly to pursue that goal. “Rotarians in every country must continuously talk it up with their fellow Rotarians and, at every opportunity, with their political leaders, to ensure support, both financial and moral.”

During a [TED](#) conversation in July, Bruce Aylward, the World Health Organization’s assistant director-general for polio eradication and related areas, called Rotarians’ efforts at the international and grassroots levels “incredibly powerful for a global health initiative like polio eradication.”

Everyone can help end the disease, Aylward said, by providing funding and reminding their communities and government leaders that polio still exists and causes tremendous suffering.

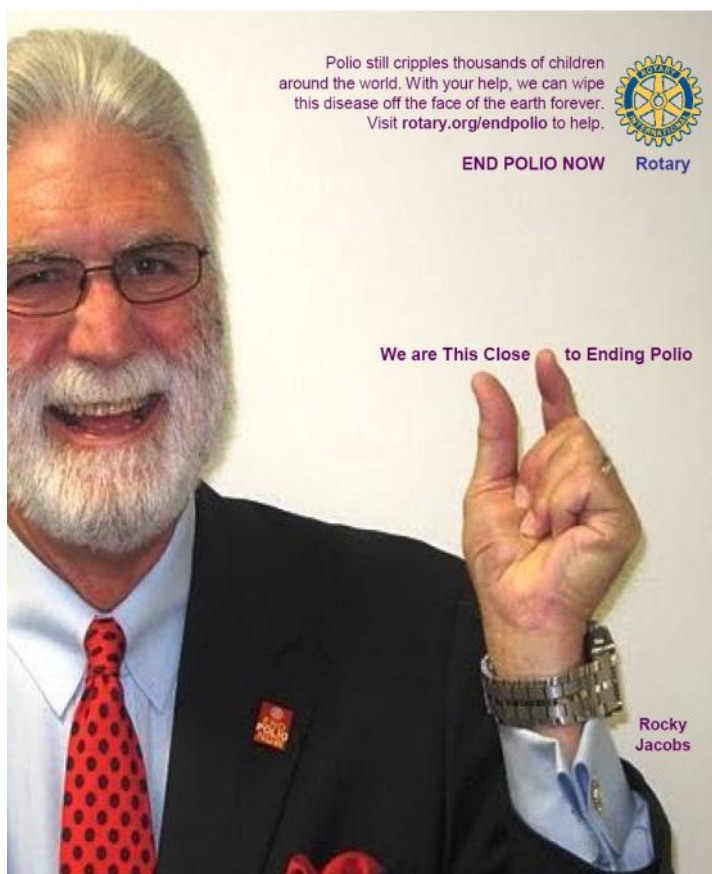
“We have the chance to ensure that no child ever suffers from polio again, and each of us plays a role in that,” he said.

# What Will Be Your Legacy?

## A bequest to The Rotary Foundation's Permanent Fund

Years ago, during a visit to New York City, I saw a T-shirt that said, "He who dies with the most wins." It seemed funny at the time, but we all read the stories of people who judge their success by their wealth. The problem is that material possessions often do not bring happiness, for there is always someone who has more.

Most of us, however, want our life to be measured by what we have done. Many Rotarians have expressed their appreciation of fellow Rotarians' service by promising a contribution to our Rotary Foundation that will live on after them. A portion of the earnings from their gifts can be designated to go to our Annual Programs Fund year after year. What better legacy to the world?

By earlier this year, we had almost 8,000 commitments to the Bequest Society. These represented an expected value of about US\$338 million, a significant share of the almost \$700 million in assets and expectancies in our Permanent Fund.

The first Australian RI president, Angus S. Mitchell (1948-49), foretold the creation of the Permanent Fund in 1992, in a speech that ended with this story from the Talmud: Choni Hama'agel saw an old man planting a carob tree and asked when he thought the tree would bear fruit. "After 70 years" was the reply. "What!" said Choni. "Do you expect to live 70 years and eat the fruit of your labor?" "I did not find the world desolate when I entered it," said the old man. "And as my fathers planted for me before I was born, so I plant for those who will come after me."

We each have that same opportunity by making a bequest to our Rotary Foundation.

### The Permanent Fund: The Rotary Foundation's Endowment Fund



We invite you to give a gift that will go beyond your lifetime: a donation to The Rotary Foundation's endowment, the Permanent Fund. This fund enables individuals to combine

their gifts into a significant force to address the world's greatest needs for generations to come. The initial target of US\$200 million for the Permanent Fund was met in 2005, six years ahead of schedule. The next target is \$1 billion by 2025.

In a Rotary year, about \$8 million from the Permanent Fund is made available to support Foundation programs.

The Rotary Foundation recognizes donors who make donations to the Permanent Fund in several different ways:

#### Benefactor

You may become a [Benefactor](#) by making the [Permanent Fund](#) a beneficiary in your estate plans or by donating \$1,000 or more to the fund outright.

#### Bequest Society

Couples or individuals who have made commitments of \$10,000 or more in their estate plans, such as in a will, living trust, or through whole or universal life insurance, can become Bequest Society members.

All Bequest Society members receive recognition from the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation. Donors may elect to receive an engraved crystal recognition piece and a Bequest Society pin. You must ask to become a Bequest Society member by filling out a [form](#).

#### Major Donor

The Rotary Foundation recognizes couples or individuals whose combined personal outright or cumulative giving has reached \$10,000. All outright contributions made to the Foundation are included in this total, regardless of the gift designation. Donors may elect to receive a crystal recognition piece and a Major Donor lapel pin or pendant.

#### Arch C. Klumph Society

Donors whose cumulative gifts total \$250,000 qualify for the Arch C. Klumph Society. Qualifiers are invited to an induction ceremony at RI headquarters in Evanston, and their pictures and biographies are installed in the Arch C. Klumph Society interactive gallery. Arch C. Klumph Society members also receive invitations to special society events, along with membership pins and crystals that commemorate giving at each level. [Arch C. Klumph Society brochure](#)

## The Arch C. Klumph Society

Named for the RI President Who Conceived of Our Foundation, the Society Honors Donors of \$250,000 or More.

Arch C. Klumph joined the Rotary Club of Cleveland in 1911 and was appointed its president in 1913. In 1916, he was elected as the sixth president of Rotary International. The first Rotary leader to propose a foundation, he eloquently promoted “endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world” at the 1917 convention in Atlanta, Georgia.

In 1918, the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri, USA, made the first gift of US\$26.50 to a fledgling fund that by 1928 grew to more than \$5,000. The endowment was significant enough to require administrators to manage it. Thus, The Rotary Foundation was born, and Klumph was selected as one of its first Trustees, serving as chairman from 1928 to 1934.

Klumph passed away on 3 June 1951 at the age of 81, but his influence still echoes through his beloved Foundation and the many Rotarians who are tirelessly dedicated to advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace. His vision has grown into an impressive

reality, and we are able to witness all of the good works the Foundation has produced in over 200 countries and geographical areas throughout the world.

During Rotary International’s centennial celebration, The Rotary Foundation Trustees sought a meaningful way to recognize the Foundation’s highest-level donors. The Trustees inaugurated the Arch C. Klumph Society in 2005. Today, members’ portraits hang in the Arch C. Klumph

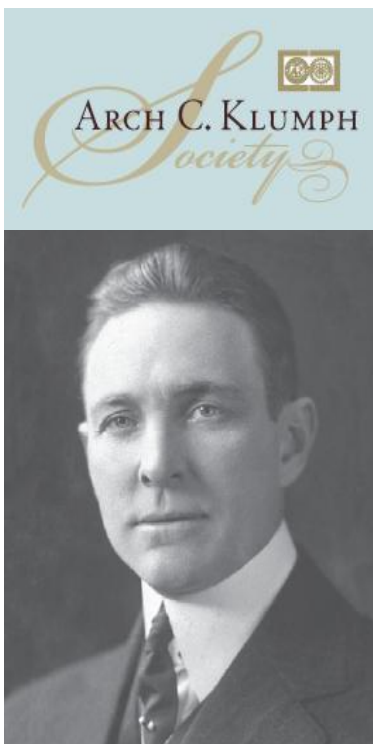

Gallery at Rotary International World Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois. A display case featuring memorabilia from Klumph’s career is a prominent part of the gallery.
